At our 70th Annual General Meeting on May 27<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Janet Dollin, President of the Board of Directors, delivered a heartfelt expressing gratitude message everyone who contributes to the success of Hillel Lodge. "Thank you to all of you— Board members, devoted staff. our incredible volunteers, the Auxiliary, the Foundation, and our donors. You are the heart of Hillel Lodge," she emphasized, acknowledging the dedication that keeps our community thriving.

Dr. Dollin reflected on our rich history, tracing back to 1954 when founders Dora Lithwick and Judge J.C. Horwitz envisioned a Jewish long-term care home in Ottawa. Their "labour of love" became a reality in 1965 with the opening of the original Ottawa Jewish Home for the Aged on Wurtemberg Street. She noted that this vision laid the groundwork for what Hillel Lodge has become today, with future generations of these founders actively involved in our community. As we celebrate this significant milestone, she highlighted the need to address the challenges we face today, including how to serve an aging population with increasing care needs while ensuring staff retention.

Dr. Dollin shared insights from our recent environmental scan, which included discussions with stakeholders such as staff, families, and community partners. Many expressed that Hillel Lodge is one of Ottawa's most respected long-term care homes, renowned for its compassionate, person-centred care. She emphasized that our greatest strength lies in the warmth of our staff, who often describe residents as family. The term "haimish" emerged frequently, capturing the uniquely Jewish warmth and sense of belonging that transforms our facility into a true home where residents are known and valued. Preserving this essence is essential as we move forward.



Likewise, Ted Cohen, CEO of Hillel Lodge, shared powerful reflections on the essence of our community, opening with a proverb: "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." He emphasized that Hillel Lodge is not a place shaped by individual efforts or short-term wins; it's a community—a tapestry of care, trust, and tradition, woven together by many hands, all working toward something enduring. In long-term care, community isn't a nice-to-have—it's everything. It's the reason our residents feel known, our families feel heard, and our staff feel supported. It's how we transform care into connection and routine into ritual.



Cohen introduced Hillel Lodge's new 2026-30 Strategic Plan, rooted in Jewish values and centered around the Hebrew word levay, meaning heart or inner spirit. This plan focuses on four key commitments: personalized care, innovation, deepening belonging, and sustaining strength. These principles guide us as we move forward together.

In closing, he shared a touching story about a longtime resident who described Hillel Lodge as a continuation of her home, where she can create new memories with loved ones. "It's not just that I live here — it's that I belong here," she said. This sentiment captures our goal to create a place where love, dignity, and belonging truly reside.

Adam Silver, President and CEO of the Jewish Federation of Ottawa, addressed the attendees about the ongoing connection between Hillel Lodge and the Jewish community, highlighting the importance of unity.





David Baker, President and Chair of the Hillel Lodge LTC Foundation, expressed his gratitude to all donors, board members, staff, and supporters as they close this chapter and look ahead. Spoke about the exceptional year, including the Dream Garden becoming a reality. He emphasized that at the heart of their mission is the belief that the community's elders deserve care with dignity, compassion, and love, and noted that together they are making this a reality every day.

Fran Ross, President of The Auxiliary of Hillel Lodge, spoke proudly about the organization celebrating its 60th anniversary this year, highlighting its longstanding commitment to the residents since the beginning. She noted that The Auxiliary's contributions play a crucial role in providing the extras that enhance the residents' lives, describing their support as the "icing on the top of the cake." This dedication to enriching the resident experience has been a vital part of Hillel Lodge's community spirit, ensuring that the needs and desires of the residents are met beyond the basics of care.

#### SHALOM PEREL PRESIDENT'S AWARD OF MERIT

The Shalom Perel President's Award of Merit is given annually to recognize an individual who works diligently, often behind the scenes, to benefit the Lodge and its residents. The recipient is someone who makes an outstanding contribution to Hillel Lodge.

This president's award of merit is named in honour of Shalom Perel, of blessed memory.

Mr. Perel was born in Russia and when he was 8 years old, he along with his parents and 3 siblings immigrated to Montreal. In his 20's he moved to Ottawa and attended the University of Ottawa. Subsequently, he found employment in the federal government as a statistician where he worked until his retirement. He was a quiet unassuming gentleman who enjoyed reading as well as classical music. Mr. Perel moved to Hillel lodge in October 1997. He passed away in July 1998. To show his appreciation for the care and attention he received at the lodge, he endowed the Lodge with almost the entirety of his considerable estate. This magnificent gift was accompanied by Shalom Perel's desire to make things better for the residents who lived at Hillel Lodge.

#### RECIPIENT OF THE SHALOM PEREL PRESIDENT'S AWARD OF MERIT: JAMES FARROW

Hillel Lodge Board of Directors proudly awards James Farrow the Shalom Perel President's Award of Merit for 2024/25. Jim served as the President of the Lodge from 2020 to 2022 and remained actively engaged as a Board member and Immediate Past President for two additional years.

After retiring as a distinguished architect, Jim joined the Board in 2016, quickly making a significant impact. He rose from Second Vice President to First Vice President and began his presidency

during the challenging COVID-19 pandemic, exemplifying calm, steady, and compassionate leadership. His presence was reassuring as he provided clear guidance and unwavering support, attending urgent virtual meetings and volunteering on-site to demonstrate the Board's commitment to staff and residents. In the later stages of the pandemic, he valued the opportunity to volunteer by serving snacks to residents, deepening his understanding of their needs and the challenges faced by the staff.

Beyond crisis management, Jim's leadership has profoundly influenced Hillel Lodge's physical and strategic infrastructure, particularly through his pivotal role in the HVAC replacement project, ensuring safety and comfort for all. He was instrumental in recruiting the current CEO, Ted Cohen, whose leadership has been vital. Additionally, Jim contributed to strategic planning efforts that clarified the governance roles of Board members, preparing future boards for their responsibilities.

James Farrow is a leader who acts not for recognition, but from a profound sense of responsibility and care for others. His legacy at Hillel Lodge is characterized by compassion, integrity, and dedicated service.

Tehila Shapiro has been selected as the recipient of the 2024/25 Sarah Lithwick Green Award for her heartfelt essay, which beautifully illustrates the profound and lasting impact of intergenerational relationships on both young people and the elderly. Through her early visits to Hillel Lodge, her close bond with her Bubby, and her participation in the L'dor Vador intergenerational program, Tehila has demonstrated deep empathy, compassion, and a commitment to kindness. She exemplifies the values of respect, leadership, and care for others—especially our elders—making a meaningful difference in the lives of those around her.







In her acceptance speech, Tehila reflected on how her experiences have underscored the importance of building relationships with the elderly. She explained that her essay aimed to showcase the significance of developing intergenerational connections, emphasizing that these relationships not only reduce loneliness but also enhance well-being, improve mental and physical health, and create valuable opportunities for connection and learning.

"Forming relationships with the elderly offers valuable opportunities for intergenerational connection and learning. Recently, I was accepted into the intergenerational program L'dor Vador, which is part of the Rabbi Bulka Kindness Project initiative. It provided me with the opportunity to meet and get to know Vera Gara, a holocaust survivor and a wonderful human being." explained Tehila during her acceptance speech. "During our monthly meetups at Hillel Lodge, we discuss our Jewish beliefs, customs, and core values and collaborate to form intellectual conversations. I continue to enjoy our visits while learning about her traditions, history, and values, like her ideology that the future generation should learn respect at a young age and never forget our past. She has taught me a lot through our discussions, strengthening our connection."

Tehila shared how her experiences have revealed the power of human connection—how a hug, a story, or even a simple conversation can brighten someone's day and leave a lasting impact. Forging relationships with the elderly teaches us empathy, patience, and wisdom, while giving seniors a sense of purpose and belonging that improves everyone's physical and mental well-being. She vowed to carry these lessons forward and continue building bridges between generations, I'dor vador—from generation to generation.

#### V'HADARTA P'NEI ZAKEN PROGRAM: CELEBRATING, HONOURING, AND RESPECTING THE ELDERLY

The V'Hadarta P'nei Zaken educational program was established in 2006, inspired by Ruthie Lebovitch's Grade 4 students from what was then Hillel Academy (now the Ottawa Jewish Community School, OJCS). When the students expressed concern for Ruthie's mother, who had been admitted to Hillel Lodge, they wanted to visit her and create thoughtful gifts. Recognizing an opportunity to channel her students' empathy, Ruthie developed a project aimed at Celebrating, Honouring, and Respecting the Elderly, facilitating meaningful interactions between students and residents.

Developed in collaboration with Rachel Kugler (also Grade 4 teacher at the time), the V'Hadarta P'nei Zaken project has exceeded expectations in fostering connections between students and residents.

Since its inception, the program has operated successfully, although it was paused during the pandemic. This year marks its return after a hiatus since 2020.

In 2016, the V'Hadarta P'nei Zaken program received the Hillel Lodge Outstanding Service Award, recognizing its significant impact. Rachel noted during the award interview, "Our V'Hadarta P'nei Zaken program provides students with a unique opportunity to engage as caring members of the community. They are always curious about the residents' diverse life experiences, and it's a joy to see them become comfortable and appreciative of the elderly as they connect with their stories."

Students typically visit Hillel Lodge twice to interview residents about their histories, memories, likes, and dislikes, ultimately creating a booklet that captures their lives. Accompanied by a Hillel Lodge volunteer or staff member, the students engage with their assigned residents in meaningful ways.

Over the years, students have gained invaluable insights from their interactions. One student reflected, "Now I look at the resident I was partnered with as a friend. I have learned we have so much in common."

Overall, the program has successfully fostered understanding and connections between students and their new friends at the Lodge. It stands as an exemplary model of intergenerational programming, highlighting the benefits of coexistence within the Ottawa Jewish Community Campus.

#### **NEWS FROM OUR GREEN THUMB CLUB**

## Resident Safety Measures: Safe Clothing and Footwear

In our ongoing tips for resident safety, we previously covered the importance of organizing living spaces to reduce clutter. In this edition of Lodge Line, we will focus on safe clothing and footwear, highlighting ways families can help reduce fall and injury risks.

#### **Provide Safe Clothing and Footwear:**

• Shoes and Slippers: Ensure all footwear fits properly and has a sturdy shape. Look for shoes with a low, even heel and treaded soles.

Recommended options include:

- o Tennis shoes with Velcro fasteners
- o Oxford-style shoes
- o Canvas or leather slip-on shoes
- Alternative Options: If a resident cannot wear safe shoes or slippers, consider using gripper socks instead, especially at night.
- Well-Fitting Clothing: Ensure that clothing fits properly. Avoid pants that drag on the ground and long robes, as these can pose a trip hazard.
- Protective Equipment: Encourage the use of protective gear, such as hip protectors, to minimize injury risk in case of a fall.

By focusing on proper clothing and footwear, families can significantly enhance the safety of their loved ones.
